Creating one new humanity

Pope Francis challenged us not to keep giving 'answers to questions that no one is asking anymore' (Pope Francis, Medellin, Sept 2017). What are the questions, then, that people are asking? At a meeting recently with a group of Year 11 students, one student gave a simple yet somewhat surprising response to this question saying:

'For me, it's how can I live my life more meaningfully?'

What was most interesting about his response was the reaction he received from the other students who spontaneously smiled and nodded in agreement. Then, each student went on, one after another, to express in their own words how they too shared a desire to understand what this question meant for them.

Our theme this year is a response to this desire and it is expressed in some ways in the closing line of Mary Oliver's poem, '*The Summer Day'*:

'Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one, wild and precious life?'

At its heart, it is a question that invites us to look at who we are, the lives we are living, and our place in the world. Our response to this question can take us on a journey in search of understanding what brings greater freedom and wholeness in our lives, and who doesn't want that? It invites us at a deeper level to consider what it means to be truly human; the brevity, beauty and mystery of life. This has implications for how we live together, as we know that as human beings we are all interconnected. Scientists tell us that every molecule is connected in such a way, that any change, even in the slightest way to the smallest molecule, will impact the whole. This concept is really quite profound; who we are, and how we live, impacts the universe.

Through greater awareness of our place and interconnectedness within everything (including the galaxies and stars, earth, animals, plants and all human life), we are challenged to a new way of being and relating with each other, creation and God. It calls for a renewed consciousness of our **need for each other, of our responsibility to creation, and of our commitment to human dignity.** This is the vision St Paul expressed when he spoke to the community of Ephesus of Jesus' mission to break down all that divides for the *creation of one new humanity (Eph 2:15)*. It's about a new way of living together and of learning how to love.

This call to one new humanity is a deeply spiritual and personal call for each one of us. It is a journey of growing in our understanding of our known and yet mysterious universe, and in our understanding of God's great desire for us to be who we are called to be. It is a human journey of both risk and responsibility, of challenge and gift, of a life bursting with possibility and meaning. It is a journey where each one of us is invited to ponder what we can create in our response to the question, 'What is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?'

Gathering Prayer

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Lord, we ask for your guidance and grace to be with us today. Help open our minds and hearts to be still to hear your word. We ask your blessings on our community, and that it unites around the life giving possibilities that union in Christ Jesus allows. *Amen.*

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians 2: 12-15

Remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our **PEACE**; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself **one new humanity** in place of the two, thus making **PEACE**.

Spend a moment in reflection re-reading the bible passage focusing your eyes on a **word or a line** that grabs your attention.

Reflection

In Paul's Letter to the Ephesians, he is addressing the divide between Jews and Gentiles but there is another deeper layer of meaning he is writing about in this letter. God has come into the world through the incarnation of Jesus to bring peace to all people on earth, regardless of religion or cultural background. The hope of the resurrection for all people becomes a reality on earth when the walls of division and hostility are broken down. In this process, a new humanity or world is created based on the quality of peace between all people.

Sister Verna Holyhead says the wall is a provocative symbol of the division Paul speaks of in Ephesians, and the ongoing challenge is to build peace and liberty in its place. Sadly, she says today there are so many walls that continue to divide in our world. Christ calls each one of his followers to the ministry of reconciliation, peacemaking and inclusion of the 'other', your neighbour, and in the process break down the barriers of race, gender, social status and any other barrier that creates divisions between God and God's love for his people.

Concluding Prayer

God of Peace, Breathe your spirit into our world and renew the face of this earth; One planet, one universe, one creation. Help us to break down the walls of division and hostility, and in its place sow a deep and lasting love that restores all people to work towards reconciliation as one humanity. We ask this prayer through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



RECOGNISING GOD IN THE DREAMTIME

(From Pope JPII address in Alice Springs 1986)

Make the sign of the cross to begin prayer

Reader 1: For thousands of years you have lived in this land and fashioned a culture that endures to this day. And during all this time, the Spirit of God has been with you. Your "*Dreaming*," which influences your lives so strongly that, no matter what happens, you remain for ever people of your culture, is your only way of touching the mystery of God's Spirit in you and in creation.

(short pause)

All: You must keep your striving for God and hold on to it in your lives...

Reader 2: For thousands of years this culture of yours was free to grow without interference by people from other places. You lived your lives in spiritual closeness to the land, with its animals, birds, fishes, waterholes, rivers, hills and mountains. Through your closeness to the land you touched the sacredness of man's relationship with God for the land was the proof of a power in life greater than yourselves. You did not spoil the land, use it up, exhaust it and then walk away from it.

All: You realised that your land was related to the source of life.

Reader 3: The silence of the Bush taught you a quietness of soul that put you in touch with another world, the world of God's Spirit. Your careful attention to the details of kinship spoke of your reverence for birth, life and human generation. You knew that children need to be loved, to be full of joy.

All: They need a time to grow in laughter and to play, secure in the knowledge that they belong to their people....

Reader 4: Some of the stories from your Dreamtime legends speak powerfully of the great mysteries of human life, its frailty, its need for help, its closeness to spiritual powers and the value of the human person. They are not unlike some of the great inspired lessons from the people among whom Jesus himself was born.

All: It is wonderful to see how people, as they accept the Gospel of Jesus, find points of agreement between their own traditions and those of Jesus and his people.

The following photos are some of the finalists.


Using one or more of these photos as a stimulus for reflection; look at the image, read the text and ask yourself:

What kind of humanity am I being asked to imagine?





Genesis 1:1-5,9-12

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was a formless void, there was darkness over the deep, and God's spirit hovered over the water. God said, 'Let there be light', and there was light. God saw that light was good, and God divided light from darkness. God called light 'day', and darkness he called 'night.'

And God said, 'Let the waters under heaven come together into a single mass, and let dry land appear.' And so it was. God called the dry land 'earth' and the mass of waters 'seas', and God saw that it was good.

Book of Wisdom 11:24-26-12:1

For you love all things that exist and detest none of the things that you have made, For you would not have made anything if you had hated it. How would anything have endured if you had not willed it? Or how would anything not called forth by you have been preserved? You spare all things, for they are yours, O Lord, you who love the living. For your immortal Spirit is in all things.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'No one can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.

'That is why I am telling you not to worry about your life and what you are to eat, nor about your body and how you are to clothe it. Surely life means more than food, and the body more than clothing! Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? Can any of you, for all his worrying, add one single cubit to his span of life? And why worry about clothing? Think of the flowers growing in the fields; they never have to work or spin; yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his regalia was robed like one of these. Now if that is how God clothes the grass in the field which is there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you men of little faith? So do not worry; do not say, "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? How are we to be clothed?" It is the pagans who set their hearts on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on his righteousness, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow: tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.'

- #1 The story of our spirituality is one of passion and compassion, passion for God and compassion for people.
- #28 Since the time of Marcellin, his disciples have made Mary known and loved. Today we continue to be convinced that to follow Jesus in the way of Mary is a privileged way of bringing our Christian journey to fullness. With a heart filled with compassion, we share this experience and conviction with children and youth helping them to experience the maternal face of the Church.
- #32 Wherever the followers of Marcellin are present, working together in mission, this "family spirit" is the Marist way of communal living. Its well-spring is the love that Jesus has for all his brothers and sisters all of humanity. Through this spirit we offer an experience of belonging and union in mission.
- #38 This same spirit encourages us to develop a simple style of life. This implies that we avoid consumerism, with its accumulation of disposable goods and wasteful use of resources. We choose to be responsible for creation, a precious gift of God to humanity. This attitude encourages us to join with others in actions necessary to preserve our environment, to enhance the harmony between humanity and nature, and to collaborate with the Creator in bringing creation to its fullness.
- #58 By entering into the fullness of such moments we discover our true humanity and the depth of our relationship with God. As we live within this relationship we come to know our true identity sons and daughters of God, brothers and sisters in life.
- #59 In our times of solitude, we cultivate an interior life that strengthens our love of, and communion with, the world. In this way we become more sensitive to life. Though we experience the poverty of our limitations and failures, we also recognize the beauty and wonder of humanity and of all creation.
- #124 Marist spirituality, being apostolic, is lived out on mission. The mission of Marist apostles is born of the experience of being loved by God and of our desire to actively participate in the mission of Jesus. God is passionate about the world and its people, and Jesus expresses this love by a ministry of teaching and healing. I came that you may have life, and have it abundantly (Jn 10:10). Like Jesus we recognise the urgings of the Spirit within, calling us to witness to this Good News. Out of these inner promptings, the mission of the Church is born: to proclaim the Kingdom of God as a new way of living for humanity, a new way to relate with God. We join in this mission of the Church as we look upon the world with compassion.
