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Holy Today

God's people: in those parents who raise their children with immense love, in those men and women who work hard to support their families, in the sick, the elderly religious who never lose their smile. It is a holiness found in our next-door neighbours, those who, living in our midst, reflect God's presence' (*Gaudate et Exultate n.7*).

Our Marist spirituality highlights this understanding of how God can be revealed, and draws particular attention to those times when life is tough or weighs heavy: 'All people and events of life offer an opportunity to encounter our merciful God. Perhaps we meet God most closely when we are vulnerable and hurting or when we stand by our word despite the cost to ourselves. When we give thanks for the gift of life, when we heal relationships, when we offer and receive forgiveness, when we celebrate the Eucharist and share the Word – all can be moments of grace to meet and know God (*Water from the Rock, n.57*).

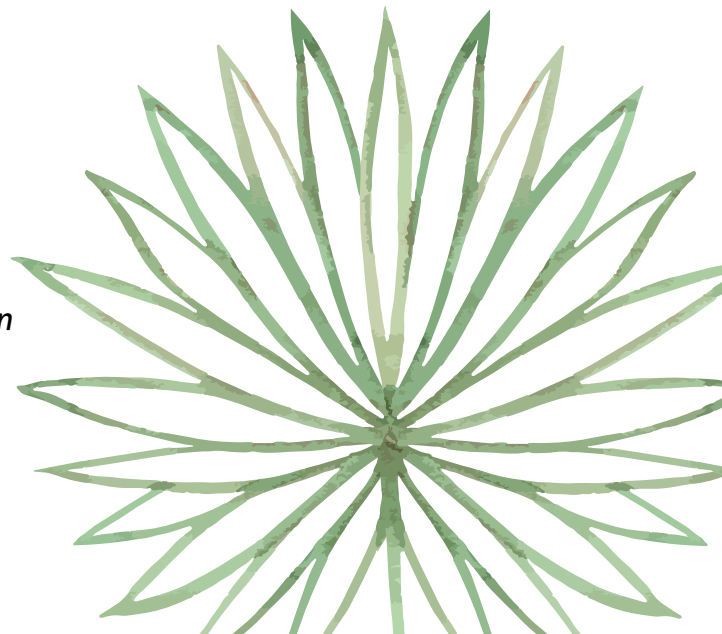
To be holy today invites us not to rush through life too quickly and miss what's really going on around us. It is about seeing with new eyes, contemplating the ordinary moments of life and recognising the beauty and wonder of life. It invites us to recognise the sacred or divine in the ordinary bread and butter moments of our lives. When this happens, in the most human of our experiences, we make the sacred or holy visible. God is with us.

The prophet Isaiah reassures us that God is indeed present and continually offers a big shout-out to remind each of us, 'I am here! I am here!'. As a Marist community let us take great comfort and encouragement knowing that God is with us, a God who continually draws us to true happiness through experiences of encounter and love in the blessed ordinariness of our lives.

Everyday life. Everyday God. Holy today.

STUDENT PRAYER 3

What would a Marist do?

...for Forgiveness

Reader 1: To forgive and be forgiven is to enter a world of freedom; it's to be free of grudges and bitterness which block and damage love within us, like water hindered in its flow.

It's to be free of misjudging others which can block the growth of friendship as tangled roots hinder the growth of the tree.

To forgive is to share in the victory of the cross, when Jesus forgave those who harmed him so much.

To forgive is to be strong enough and to really believe that the person is bigger than any actions.

To forgive is to grow, and to allow oneself to be forgiven is to grow also into a deeper sharing in the forgiving love of God.

Reader 2: We pray that we can be sensitive to how others find their lives, not judging people just by how they look; knowing that there is so much more going on than meets the eye.

All: *Lord in your compassion, hear our prayer.*

Reader 3: We pray that all of us may have hearts like your Son's, open to the hopes and troubles of everyone we meet.

All: *Lord in your compassion, hear our prayer.*

Reader 4: Let us pray that we can be people of forgiveness, knowing that we too are forgiven by God.

All: *Lord in your compassion, hear our prayer.*

Reader 5: We pray Lord for anyone who has hurt us, in our family, among our friends or in school and for people who have let us down. Bless them and show them your kindness, even when we feel angry towards them.

All: *Lord in your compassion, hear our prayer.*

Reader 6: Lord God, may your example of forgiveness, shown in Jesus, help us to forgive others. We pray that your people everywhere may show in their lives and relationships the power and strength of forgiveness. In Jesus name we pray.

All: *Amen*



STAFFPRAYER 1

Leader: In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says to us:

*"You are the light of the world.
A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden.
Neither does a person light a lamp and put
it under a tub, but upon the lamp stand, so
as to give light to all in the house. In the
same way let your light shine before people,
in order that they may see your good works
and give glory to your Father in heaven"*

Help us to be willing bearers of the light of the gospel in both message and action.

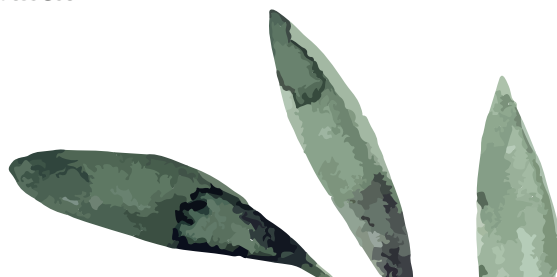
Help us to be a light to those who need our assistance and love.

As Thomas Merton says:

“BEFORE A MAN CAN BECOME A SAINT, HE MUST FIRST OF ALL BE A MAN IN ALL THE HUMANITY AND FRAGILITY OF MAN’S ACTUAL CONDITION, OTHERWISE WE WILL NEVER BE ABLE TO UNDERSTAND THE MEANING OF THE WORD ‘SAINT’. NOT ONLY WERE ALL THE SAINTS PERFECTLY HUMAN, NOT ONLY DID THEIR SANCTITY ENRICH AND DEEPEN THEIR HUMANITY, BUT THE HOLIEST OF ALL THE SAINTS, JESUS CHRIST, WAS HIMSELF THE MOST DEEPLY AND PERFECTLY HUMAN BEING WHO EVER LIVED ON EARTH. WE MUST REMEMBER THAT HUMAN NATURE WAS, IN JESUS, QUITE PERFECT, AND AT THE SAME TIME COMPLETELY LIKE OUR OWN FRAIL AND SUFFERING NATURE IN ALL THINGS EXCEPT SIN... IF WE ARE TO BE ‘PERFECT’ AS CHRIST IS PERFECT, WE MUST STRIVE TO BE AS PERFECTLY HUMAN AS HE IS.”

STAFF REFLECTION 1

Perhaps we can only assume that it was through his steadfast faith in Mary, Our Good Mother and her son Jesus that St Marcellin Champagnat found his guidelines on how to strive for holiness. He would have encouraged his young Brothers to embrace the call of their baptism and make it their own. As someone we know to be grounded and authentic, he would have acknowledged his weakness and imperfections in his desire to follow Jesus radically and faithfully day after day. He believed in God's grace and the love of Mary and added to this a life of commitment and purpose. Marcellin accepted God's invitation to holiness.

Pope Francis reminds us that *holiness is God's gift* ...

[It] is not the prerogative of only a few: holiness is a gift that is offered to all, without exception, so that it constitutes the distinctive character of every Christian... everyone is called to holiness in their own state of life... it is by living with love and offering Christian witness in our daily tasks that we are called to be saints.¹

So how do you see holiness? Does the concept of it overwhelm you? Well, how you view God is important; if you accept that he loves you unconditionally and if you believe in his compassion for you then you can be confident in your holiness.

But if you see yourself as unworthy, shame! Our call to be holy comes from God...it is why he made us, after all... and if that is the case, then it is what we were always meant to be.

STAFF REFLECTION 2



The fictional character, Anne of Green Gables, once said,

"If I really wanted to pray, I'll tell you what I'd do. I'd go out into a great big field all alone or in the deep, deep woods and I'd look up into the sky – up-up-up-up – into that lovely blue sky that looks as if there was no end to its blueness. And I'd just feel a prayer."

Visio Divina is a visual prayer which invites us to see at a more contemplative pace. It invites us to see all there is to see, exploring the entirety of the image. It invites us to see deeply, beyond first and second impressions, beyond initial ideas, judgments, or understandings. It invites us to be surprised and transformed by God.

A beautiful way to pray is to let an image question us.

Leader:

Before you begin, take a moment to open your heart and mind to God. (pause)

When you are ready, look at the image; its forms, figures, colours, lines, textures, and shapes. (pause)

To what or whom do you find yourself drawn? What do you like and not like? (pause)

This painting is from the perspective of Christ facing his disciples. You see a face reflected in the communion cup of red wine which is held by two hands; the Chi Rho symbol in the broken bread; the shadow of the cross covers the table. (pause)

Close your eyes.

Now, open them and this time think a little more fully about the meanings that come to you, and the feelings associated with the image and its colours and forms. (pause)

What does the image reveal to you? What does it and the Spirit want to say, evoke, or express to you? (pause)

Look at the reflected face in the cup. It cannot be that of any of the disciples around the table. It is unlikely to be that of Jesus, given the angles. That leaves the face of the viewer. Your face. (pause)

The questions asked of us in this image are: What are you bringing to the table with Jesus? And if it is not you reflected in the cup, where, in the painting, would you like to be?

Whose voice do you hear? What is being said? (pause)

Become aware of your feelings and thoughts and now think about how they are directly connected to your life. (pause)

What desires and longings are evoked in you? (pause)

Take the time to respond to God in your prayer: gratitude or wonder.

Might God be inviting you to act in some way or a new way of seeing or thinking?

Close your eyes and bring your prayer to a close by resting in God's grace and love.

STAFF REFLECTION 3

Don't Show me. Tell me.

There is nothing more attractive than holiness.

When somebody actually lives the Gospel of Jesus Christ, it is phenomenally attractive to all men and women—men and women of faith, men and women of no faith. When somebody actually lives Christianity, it is very, very, very powerful.

You take someone like Mother Teresa. She is 4-foot-nothing, you drop her down there in the slums of Calcutta, and bam! You got it. She captivates the city, she captivates the country, she captivates the imagination of the whole world! Why? Because there's nothing more attractive than holiness.

It's universally attractive. It cuts through biases, it cuts across prejudices, and it engages people.

And you and I, we're called to be holy in our own way, in our own place, in our own time. That's why it's so important that we believe that holiness is possible for you and me. That's why it's so important that we get out there and start creating Holy Moments.

Because you can create more Holy Moments today than you did yesterday, and there's nothing more attractive than holiness.

And we live in an age, more than ever before, that is full of words. We live in an age where people are drowning in words. And this age, this culture, that's drowning in words is sending Christianity a message. And their message is, "Don't tell me. Show me."

In a world of words, where they're drowning in words, people actually want to see someone in action. They want to see someone living the Gospel of Jesus Christ who is their next-door neighbour, or their colleague at work, or their friend. "Don't tell me, show me." That's the message the people of our age are sending us.

There's nothing more attractive than holiness. Let's get out there and create some Holy Moments.

THE CALL TO HOLINESS AND PRAYER

Leviticus 20:26

The Book of Leviticus reminds us living the Christian life is essentially a call to holiness and prayer for each one of us. You are to be holy to me because I, the Lord, am holy, and I have set you apart from the nations to be my own (LV 20:26). Father Michael Fallon says "the link between holiness and prayer is obvious when we realise that to be holy is to be in communion with God. It is a communion of the real self with the real God. Since God is love, it is obvious that holiness is intimately related to love". So, when we love we are expressing our love of God and God's son Jesus who came to save us. Fallon says through Jesus we are drawn into "communion with the Holy One not by withdrawal from the body, from the mind, from thoughts and feelings, but by allowing the Holy One to draw us into the heart of the created world where God will transform us. In the light of the Incarnation, we came to the astonishing insight that God is indeed the 'heart' as well as the 'beyond' of everything". When we connect with our loved ones, our close friends, work colleagues, neighbours, bus conductors, people in our local restaurants or strangers we acknowledge with a smile as we walk past on a beautiful autumn morning stroll, we are connecting with the God of the everyday and in the process witnessing to our baptismal call to be holy to God.

AN INVITATION TO BE HOLY

John 20:21

Jason Gaboury says the gospel message is an invitation to enter more fully into the life and holiness of Jesus. He asks, "how can we engage with holiness as a gift of life, health, and relationship with God? The beauty of God's holiness is embodied most profoundly in Jesus. Like the burning coal in Isaiah 6, Jesus had a profound ability to transfer holiness to others by touching them. In his ministry, Jesus often touched unholy/unclean people, including lepers, dead bodies, a woman with haemorrhages, and demonised men. His holiness seemed to pass to them, healing their bodies, freeing their minds, restoring them to community. In his death, Jesus offered to God the perfect holy and obedient life that we cannot. In his resurrection, Jesus breathed his Spirit into his people with the profound words, **As the Father has sent me, I am sending you . . . (Jn 20:21)**. The call to holiness is not a call to try harder, enjoy less, and judge more. It's a call to contemplate the beauty and wonder of who God is and what God has done in Jesus. It's an invitation to order our lives toward wholeness, life, and generativity. It's a daring call to rub shoulders with people who, like my teenage self, presume that God is judgmental and angry through the grace and power of the Spirit. How are you growing in holiness during this season?"

FOR ME TO BE A SAINT MEANS TO BE MYSELF

Psalm 139

"There are at least two reasons why we may find it hard to believe that being holy starts with being ourselves. First, before many of us can accept this truth, we may find ourselves trying to be someone who we are not, based on another person's interpretation of holiness. And second, once we finally set aside the notion that we're supposed to be someone else, it's a long process discovering who we really are. At the heart of this understanding is accepting who you are before God. **For it was you who formed me in my inward parts, you knit me together in my mother's womb**, says Psalm 139. God loves us like a parent loves a child—often more for the parts of the child that are weaker or where the child struggles or falters. More often than not, those very weaknesses are the most important paths to holiness, because they remind you of your reliance on God".

REJOICE AND BE GLAD

Matthew 5:12

Steven Millies, Professor of Theology at Catholic Theological Union reflecting on Pope Francis' exhortation *Gaudete et Exsultate* says on holiness, "What is a holy life? In fact, that is a worldly question because our lives are lived in the world. The saints already in heaven do not worry about holiness. They have achieved it, so they "encourage and accompany us" (*Gaudete et Exsultate*, Chapter 1). But we pursue holiness throughout our lives, and the world is the field in which we toil. Pope Francis describes holiness as the Christian's "mission on earth" (19), and because it is an earthly mission it must inevitably have implications that will be social and political. For these reasons, *Gaudete et Exsultate* dwells on our seeking holiness in the world together — "The Holy Spirit bestows holiness in abundance among God's holy and faithful people" (6). Note the use of the preposition **among**: there is no doubt that Pope Francis intends us to understand not only that the Spirit bestows holiness widely, but that holiness is found and experienced together. We are saved "as a people who might acknowledge [God] in truth," and "no one is saved alone, as an isolated individual" (6). Indeed, "We are never completely ourselves unless we belong to a people" (6).

MODERN DAY FRESCOES

NATHAN AHEARNE

"How do we reach an uneducated, illiterate, unformed generation of young people who are missing the opportunity to discover the message of the Gospel? This was exactly the question that 16th century painters tackled head on with their adornment of chapels, depicting scenes from Christ's life, such as the work by Corenzio in the Salerno Cathedral, which decoratively retells Matthew's Gospel (see below). These frescoes and other forms of art were able to communicate messages which transcended literature and language, helping to cross boundaries of evangelisation. What lessons can these masters teach us today?"

"Over the centuries, painters, musicians and writers have been captivating the soul through their emotive works which have drawn people closer to an encounter with God. How well do we engage the senses as modern Religious Educators? Do we seek new forms of art that speak to young people, or settle for the use of familiar textbooks, powerpoint slides and worksheets? "

"If we are going to be relevant and engaging, it's because we are speaking the language of the day. We can't expect a medium created in the early 2000's to speak to a 2018 audience"

"God gives life and being and existence to everything, so finding God in all things is just a matter of paying attention. You look at spring buds on the trees, and you see God giving them life. In the hustle of life, it's easy for us to miss these God moments. Time and time again, we must remind ourselves to look and listen more attentively to the ways God is present to us (Page. x)"

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"At times prayer for me became a conversation with God, but I also had quiet nights in prayer when there was no light in my bedroom but a small tealight candle in a red glass votive cup. It was simple and disarming. My prayer had no words. It was nothing more than watching the flicker of the flame and feeling God's presence in the room. There was something about the flame that revealed God to me. A flame has a life of its own, flickering and moving on its own, even without an apparent breeze. Sometimes the orange-red flame goes wild, while at other moments it sits calmly and still. It was alive like me, like the Spirit, and was providing warmth and light as if by magic. But the force behind it was God." (p.3)

Second Reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (1: 12–14; 2: 44-47)

The Apostles returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet near Jerusalem – a mere Sabbath’s journey away. Entering the city, they went to the upstairs room where they were staying: Peter and John and James and Andrew; Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew; James, son of Alphaeus; Simon, the zealot party member, and Judas, son of James.
