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One Wild and Precious Life

Pope Francis challenged us not to keep giving 'answers to questions that no one is asking anymore' (Pope Francis, Medellin, Sept 2017). What are the questions, then, that people are asking? At a meeting recently with a group of Year 11 students, one student gave a simple yet somewhat surprising response to this question saying:

'For me, it's how can I live my life more meaningfully?'

What was most interesting about his response was the reaction he received from the other students who spontaneously smiled and nodded in agreement. Then, each student went on, one after another, to express in their own words how they too shared a desire to understand what this question meant for them.

Our theme this year is a response to this desire, and it is expressed in some ways in the closing line of Mary Oliver's poem, 'The Summer Day':

'Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one, wild and precious life?'

At its heart, it is a question that invites us to look at who we are, the lives we are living, and our place in the world. Our response to this question can take us on a journey in search of understanding what brings greater freedom and wholeness in our lives, and who doesn't want that? It invites us at a deeper level to consider what it means to be truly human; the brevity, beauty and mystery of life. This has implications for how we live together, as we know that as human beings we are all interconnected. Scientists tell us that every molecule is connected in such a way, that any change, even in the slightest way to the smallest molecule, will impact the whole. This concept is really quite profound; who we are, and how we live, impacts the universe.

Through greater awareness of our place and interconnectedness within everything (including the galaxies and stars, earth, animals, plants and all human life), we are challenged to a new way of being and relating with each other, creation and God. It calls for a renewed consciousness of our need for each other, of our responsibility to creation, and of our commitment to human dignity. This is the vision St Paul expressed when he spoke to the community of Ephesus of Jesus' mission to break down all that divides for the creation of one new humanity (Eph 2:15). It's about a new way of living together and of learning how to love.

This call to one new humanity is a deeply spiritual and personal call for each one of us. It is a journey of growing in our understanding of our known and yet mysterious universe, and in our understanding of God's great desire for us to be who we are called to be. It is a human journey of both risk and responsibility, of challenge and gift, of a life bursting with possibility and meaning. It is a journey where each one of us is invited to ponder what we can create in our response to the question, 'What is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?



IN THE BEGINNING LECTIO DIVINA

What is Lectio Divina?

Lectio is an ancient form of prayer listening to the Word of God or 'praying with the heart'. It involves reading the scripture passage aloud to let oneself hear the words. When finished reading, pause and recall if a word or phrase stood out. If so, pause and savour the insight. Then go back and read the passage again. Pause again and note what happened. Now begin following the steps below.



Get into a comfortable **POSTURE** which will help you better listen to God.



Focus on God's **PRESENCE**. The gift of faith tells you God wants to communicate with you!



READ the scripture passage from John's Gospel once, slowly.



PRAY. Ask yourself, "What is this passage saying to me or about me?" Remember that this same passage can be said to be God's "love letter" to you at this particular moment. Thank God. Praise God. Ask God for wisdom. Ask God for what you need, all while remaining quiet.



RE-READ the short Gospel passage. Are there any new inspirations that come to you?



CONCLUDE by

thinking about "How can I live this passage today?" and by making a resolution for the day. Remember: your resolution for the day should be something practical and concrete and capable of fulfilling. End this spiritual exercise with the Our Father prayer.

LETTERS OF LOVE

St Marcellin Champagnat's letters tell us so much about his love and concern for both the brothers and the young people in his care. When the brothers were sent out to the schools they were often very young and not well trained. Because of this, Marcellin would often support them through his letters.

A letter from St Marcellin Champagnat to Br Barthelemy (14)

Champagnat writes:

"...The children will model themselves on you... What a wonderful and sublime occupation you have! You are constantly among the very people with whom Jesus Christ was so delighted to be, since he expressly forbade his disciples to prevent children from coming to him... How happy I would be if I could be a teacher, and devote myself even more directly to educating these impressionable children!

'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs.' Luke 18:16"

Lord we pray, that just as Champagnat encouraged Br Barthelemy and his fellow brothers, reminding them all of the important role they play in the lives of the young people in their care, that we remember how important we are to those young people entrusted to us. Just as Marcellin reminded his fellow brothers how Jesus so loved the little children, so must we. 



Leader: In John's Gospel, Jesus says to us:

STUDENTPRAYER 2

Leader: Psalm 18 reads:

I love you, O Lord, my strength. The Lord is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer, my God, my rock in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. I call upon the Lord, who is worthy to be praised, so I shall be saved from my enemies.

The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands.



STUDENTRESOURCE 4 WHO IS JOHN BERNE?

The John Berne School is a small Marist school in the inner west of Sydney catering for students who do not fit the model of mainstream education. Do you know how the school got its name? The name of the school traces its origins right back to Father Marcellin Champagnat in the French countryside near LaValla in 1820. It is a powerful story every Marist student and staff member should know because it tells us much about Marcellin's belief in the power of 'hope always' when it came to the young. Here is the story of John Berne (in French Jean-Baptiste).

Slowly read the following story of young John Berne, pausing after each paragraph to reflect on the characteristic or value we see in Marcellin. Perhaps have a journal or exercise book and pen with you to write some responses.

Marcellin Champagnat

was called one day to the bedside of a seriously ill woman to hear her confession. He found her to be in a destitute condition, even lacking any fuel for a fire. Marcellin consoled her whist he heard her confession and asked her to place her trust in God. As well, knowing that this was not enough, he brought her all that would be necessary in the way of food, clothing and fuel. He procured a nurse for her and arranged for a doctor to visit her. She died soon afterwards.

Marcellin decided to adopt the son she left behind, Jean-Baptiste Berne, aged 9, and brought him to live with the Brothers. The boy had known little love and no control; he had formed bad habits that had started to ruin his character and to corrupt his natural innocence. He resisted the efforts of the Brothers to care for him, returning their love, food, clothing, and education with



insults and ingratitude. He ran away many times, taking up the life of a beggar.

Reflect: Why does Marcellin believe that John Berne's mother should place her trust in God?

Reflect: Why do you think young Jean-Baptiste (John) chooses to fight with the Brothers who only want to help him? What sort of student do you think he was?

Each time, the Brothers searched him out and

brought him home. Some of them became discouraged and felt the boy to be a hopeless case and a waste of their time. Not so for Marcellin. He urged the brothers to be patient, to pray for the boy and to remember that he had nowhere else to go. To send him away was to send him to a life of poverty, crime and loneliness. Marcellin Champagnat believed that the Lord had entrusted the boy to him and to the Brothers, and he was to be treated as if he was their own child. He said to them, "we have adopted this child,

we have no right to abandon him, we must keep him and form him". With courage and perseverance, the efforts of the Brothers and Marcellin Champagnat paid off.

Reflect: What did you discover about the qualities of Marcellin as he asked the Brothers to be patient with John?

MARCELLIN'S LETTERS

One of the best sources we have that tell us something about the person and character of Marcellin Champagnat are his letters. We have over 300 of them in the Marist archives in Rome written by Marcellin himself to a range of audiences, but largely the Brothers. Let's look at one them and see what insights can be gained about what type of person Marcellin was.

Background to the letter:

The Founder is no doubt answering a New Year's letter from Brother Barthélemy (Badard), as he will again the following year. Br Barthelemy was the Director (Principal) of a small village (hamlet) school. We do not have the brother's letter, so we do not know if he also wrote about other personal matters. In any case, Father Champagnat takes advantage of the opportunity to encourage him by showing him what a noble vocation he has.

Activity:

1. Read Letter No.14 to Brother Barthelemy (pg 27).

2. Answer the questions that follow.

Questions:

1. What do you think Marcellin meant by saying to Br Barthelemy "you will consequently have many copies of your virtues" in his opening paragraph?

2. In the second paragraph Marcellin describes teaching as a "sublime occupation" and compares Brother Barthelemy's vocation as comparable to Jesus teaching the young. Can you find **TWO** passages from the New Testament where Jesus is teaching the children? What does Jesus say to the children in these passages?

3. Why do you think it is so important for Marcellin in the to remind Brother Barthelemy about the goal of leading the children to Jesus?

4. In the third paragraph Marcellin asks Br Barthelemy to "tell your children that Jesus and Mary love them all very much". How is the love of Jesus, Mary and Marcellin going to help the students?

5. Imagine you are Br Barthelemy, the Director of a little Marist school in the French countryside, and write a short letter of three to four paragraphs responding to Marcellin's letter from the Hermitage.



Letters of Marcellin No. 14 21 January 1830

Dear Brother Barthélemy and your dear fellow-worker,

I was very glad to hear from you and to know that you are in good health. I also know that you have many children in your school; you will consequently have many copies of your virtues, because the children will model themselves on you, and will certainly follow your example.

What a wonderful and sublime occupation you have! You are constantly among the very people with whom Jesus Christ was so delighted to be, since he expressly forbade his disciples to prevent children from coming to him. And you, dear friend, far from preventing them, are making every effort to lead them to him. What a reception you will have in your turn, from this divine and generous master, who does not let even a glass of cold water go without its reward!

Tell your children that Jesus and Mary love them all very much: those who are good because they resemble Jesus Christ, who is infinitely good; those who are not yet good, because they will become so. Tell them that the Blessed Virgin also loves them, because she is the mother of all the children in our schools. And tell them that I love them very much too; and that I never once say Mass without thinking of you and your dear children.

How happy I would be if I could be a teacher, and devote myself even more directly to educating these impressionable children!

Things are going fairly well in all the other establishments. Pray for me and for everyone here.

This belief remained constant all through his life. Jesus and Mary were the treasure on which Marcellin had learned to place his own heart... All to Jesus through Mary, all to Mary for Jesus, captures this close relationship between the Son and the Mother and our Founder's attitude of confidence in Mary, which we are invited to live.

The Visitation Mary Southhard



4. Rest and reflect in God. As you close your time in prayer, open your eyes and gaze again upon the image. Rest in God's presence as you reflect upon this prayer experience. Consider how you'll take this into your life today, tomorrow, next month, next year.

In the mystery of "The Visitation," explains Mary Southard, C.S.J, each of us is invited to "experience our deep interconnectedness with one another and with all being: The Holy One present and alive and growing in me recognizes that same Divinity in You." 
STUDENTRESOURCE 7 FAMILY SPIRIT VISIO DIVINA


Gospel Reflection

John's Gospel begins by describing Jesus as the Word through the use of symbolic language. Jesus as the Word, who was with God in the beginning of creation, became flesh to live among us. "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep..."
